Report: 2017 Annual Meeting

There was quite a bit to report at the 2017 Annual Meeting of the Board of Sausalito Village on Tuesday, February 21st thanks to a very active membership of volunteers! BUT the first order of business for the meeting was to announce the unanimous election of our newest member to the Board of Directors, Ceci Brown. Ceci has been volunteering for Sausalito Village and CARSS for over a year as a driver, member of the Healthcare

Advocacy Committee and liaison to Rotary with our joint Chore Day. Ceci has already added to our meetings with her great sense of humor and willingness to work hard.

The newly forming Emeritus Group was also announced at the meeting. Members include past members of the original steering committee and retired SV Board members. Stella Shao and Betsy Stroman are leading this effort. The first task that the Group will engage in is the hosting of a party to celebrate all donors to our Village. If this includes YOU, your invitation will be in the mail later this spring.

Sausalito Village is in good financial shape - it doesn't hurt that nearly all of our work is done by volunteers. Our one paid staff is our Concierge, Connie, who receives a monthly stipend to answer the phones Monday through Friday 9:00am - 5:00pm, coordinate service requests, answer questions and provide some administrative reports. In addition, Rotary Housing provides free office space for Village meetings to take place. Other than that, everything else is done with volunteer hours which means we can spend money on programs, scholarships and subsidies such as the discount provided to all members who purchased the Grab And Go Emergency Backpacks.

Members of Sausalito Village pay \$200 for a one or two person household - this is one of the lowest membership fees in the country. In fact, in the recent national survey (see below) the average membership is \$431 for a single membership and \$601 for a 2-person membership. Some of the costliest memberships are in urban areas such as the Bay Area where they can be as high as \$1200 for a 2-person household. The difference in costs? Most Villages have paid full time Executive Directors and staff which requires a good deal of fundraising, and that, in turn, requires more staff time.

Power of Partnerships - Rotary and Sausalito Village



Sausalito Village partnered with Rotary, Rotary Housing and Paradise Properties (the management company for Rotary properties) to provide Grab and Go Emergency Backpacks for all residents of Rotary Housing. Flo Hoylman and Annie Dorsey of the SV Be Prepared Committee designed the backpacks and negotiated a great group rate. In addition, Flo and Annie provided a workshop about the backpacks and other emergency preparedness issues.

In March we will once again be partnering with Rotary for the Senior Chore Day, a once a year program that brings volunteers from SV and Rotary to work together to do non-professional chores around the house (think muscle, not brains!). This is an expansion of the battery exchange program that the Rotary has run for many years to change the batteries in existing smoke detectors.

Last year we joined forces and expanded the program to provide help with tasks such as changing ceiling lightbulbs, flipping mattresses, moving a piece of furniture or potted plants, bringing things down from higher shelves, etc.

"This reading (familiar to many) comes to my mind, as a metaphor of how we are strengthened in community if we work together.

Lessons from Geese

Fact 1: As each goose flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the birds that follow. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

Fact 2: When a goose falls out of formation, it feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help, and give our help to others.

Fact 3: When the lead goose tires, it moves back in the formation and another flies to the point position.

Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership. As with geese, people are interdependent on each other's skills and unique arrangements of gifts, talents and resources.

Fact 4: The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those in front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement the production is greater...

Fact 5: When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down or help to protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again....

Lesson: If we have as much sense as geese, we will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.
