

Peptoc provides callers with words of encouragement from young students

Inundated with the harsh realities of the world right now? <u>Just call /0/-998-8410</u> for words of wisdom, encouragement, and life advice from a group of eager elementary school children. It's a small, but needed, dose of joy.

"Hi, welcome to Peptoc, a public art project by West Side School," a child recites to you when you call the number. The kid-led menu then shares a few pick-me-up options: "If you're feeling mad, frustrated, or nervous, press 1. If you need words of encouragement and life advice, press 2. If you need a pep talk from kindergartners, press 3. If you need to hear kids laughing with delight, press 4. If you would like to make a donation to support this project, please press 6. For encouragement in Spanish, press 5." Each option takes you to a variety of children's voices, insights, and in one case, just laughter.

The free hotline, called Peptoc, is a public art project created by two teachers and students at West Side Elementary in Healdsburg, California. The educators and artists, Jessica Martin and Asherah Weiss, wanted to provide a positive respite for callers using the inspiring words of their students. The hotline was launched on Feb. 26 and quickly shot up to hundreds of callers every hour, NPR reported. Since then, the hotline has reached thousands of people, and Martin explained to Mashable over email that Peptoc currently averages 3,000 callers each day.

What is the Difference Between a Road, Boulevard, Avenue....

The basic premise behind road-naming conventions, which are fairly consistent around the world, is that the name bestowed upon a road depends upon its size and function. A road, for example, is a path that connects two points. Generally, roads head out of town or away from the heart of a city. A street, in contrast, is a public road with buildings on both sides. This means that a street is also a road, but a road isn't necessarily a street.

Avenues generally run perpendicular to streets but also have trees and buildings on both sides. And each municipality decides in which direction to place its streets and avenues. In Manhattan, for example, avenues run north and south, while streets run east and west. In Denver, it's the opposite. And in Tucson, they got innovative, calling the roads running diagonally to streets and avenues "stravenues" (postal abbreviation = STRA).

So streets, avenues and roads are the main names for our passages. But here are some other common road definitions.

- Boulevard: A wide street with trees and other vegetation on one or both sides and, often, a median to divide traffic.
- Court: A street ending in a loop or a circle, aka a cul-de-sac.
- Crescent: A winding, curved road that typically attaches to another road at each end.

- Lane: A narrow road that typically leads to a residential zone. Lanes are often found in rural areas.
- Place: A road or street with a dead end that's not a loop or circle.
- **Terrace:** A street following the upper portion of a slope.
- Way: A small street branching off a road. These passages are usually short and often feature a dead end.

Why 'Wednesday' Isn't Pronounced the Way It's Spelled

What's in a name? Wednesday Addams may owe a debt to the Germanic god Wodan.

Most Americans don't pronounce the first "d" in Wednesday. But there it is, sitting pretty. So what gives?

Well, that's a question for the ages. The Middle Ages, to be exact.

The medieval period, also called the Middle Ages, is a period in European history that stretches from the fifth to the 15th century C.E. It's also a time that had great influence over the dialects that would eventually form our modern English language.

American English is rooted in ancient European languages. As far back as the fifth century, several related Germanic dialects were introduced to Anglo-Saxon realms in what is now Scotland. As people interacted, languages fused and a dialect known as Old English emerged. This "borrowed" language, which sprung from many roots, continued to transform over the centuries. It later took on the influence of Romance languages, which sprung from Latin, as well as a version of the French language spoken by Viking raiders who conquered areas of England. By the 11th century, this new variety of English became known as Middle English.

Even now, language continues to change and adapt because of the influences of a variety of cultures and developments. The Merriam-Webster Collegiate dictionary, for instance, recently upped its content count by more than 1000 words, adding specimens like binge-watch, photobomb and truther.
