Choosing the best weather apps for you

The Weather Channel and AccuWeather consistently rank at or near the top of the app charts for weather. Other weather apps include WeatherBug, Weather Underground, Fox Weather, Windy.com and Carrot Weather. There's also Apple Weather, the built-in iPhone weather app.

These are considered all-in-one weather apps that provide some combination of current conditions, hourly and daily forecasts, radar, satellite, air quality, pollen, weather articles and videos, and push alerts for precipitation and severe weather. Each app has its own features of note:

- The Weather Channel provides a radar forecast 24 hours into the future.
- AccuWeather displays a minute-by-minute forecast of precipitation for the next four hours.

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- Weather Underground displays hyperlocal data from more than 250,000 personal weather stations.
- Fox Weather provides access to its 24/7 live stream of weather news and has a unique 3D radar view.
- Windy.com features eye-catching weather maps with more than 50 layers to choose from.
- Carrot Weather reports current conditions with a personality of your choosing (if you're into sass with your weather app) and lets you pick the forecast source.
- Apple Weather incorporates many features from the now defunct Dark Sky app, which Apple acquired in 2020, though finding them takes a bit of practice.
- Many local TV news stations have their own weather apps, which often provide a video or text forecast for the local area by one of the station's meteorologists.

Most weather apps offer a free baseline set of data and forecasts, although which features are included can vary widely. You usually will have to pay for more-advanced features, such as lightning or longer-range forecasts, and you'll have to pay if you want an ad-free experience. One exception is Apple's native weather app, which is entirely free and contains no advertisements.

With so many weather apps on the market, it may be worth first exploring what you can get free.

To give you a sense of typical pricing, AccuWeather charges 99 cents a month for Premium (no ads) and \$1.99 a month for Premium Plus (no ads and extra features). Carrot Weather has paid versions from \$1.67 to \$3.33 a month, the Weather Channel is \$1.99 or \$4.99 a month, and Weather Underground is \$3.99 a month.

Forbes Island had Sausalito roots

On December 23, 1980, a houseboat anchored in Richardson Bay, close to Sausalito in Marin County, California, became Forbes Island.

It was built between 1975 and 1980 by Forbes Thor Kiddoo, who invested \$800,000 in the floating home. He used old vessel portholes,

The property included 15 rooms, three staterooms, a 600 square foot salon with wood elements, mirrors, brass, Persian rugs, a fireplace, a chess table, grand piano and English pipe organ, and a wine cellar.

By the late 1980s, locals in Sausalito complained about the property being illegally moored.

According to Islands Magazine, Kiddoo wanted to sell the houseboat in 1987. Still, it wasn't until 1991 that the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission made him leave Sausalito because of building regulations.

Following his eviction, Kiddoo attempted to anchor his barge in Half Moon Bay but was refused. He anchored it in Antioch, California, for five years and spent time renovating it before obtaining a 15-year renewable lease in San Francisco.

In 1999, the island-dwelling was moved and reopened as the Forbes Island restaurant between Pier 39 and Pier 41 in San Francisco's Fisherman's Wharf. It was the Bay Area's only "floating island" restaurant, measuring 50 by 100 feet and weighing 700 tons, with its own palm trees, waterfall, fake fireplace, 55-step lighthouse with Fresnel lens, and Tahitian dining room.

The underwater dining area was made to seem like the inside of an early 19th-century sailing ship. The restaurant featured its own wine cellar, which was once used for a Tony Bennett performance, as well as a women's boudoir.

Repair and renovation work was done on the Island in 2016. To start a two-month rehabilitation, a fireboat from the San Francisco Fire Department moved the island to Pier 70's BAE Systems San Francisco Ship Repair Yard on April 5. Afterward, it was brought back to its original spot next to Pier 39, where it was supposed to reopen on June 15.

Forbes Kiddoo retired and the Forbes Island Restaurant closed in August 2017.

The restaurant was reported to be for sale and unlikely to reopen as a restaurant in March 2018 when it was moored at the Holland Riverside

During the hot days this fall, ants entered my house. Then they left. This winter they came in again during the rain. What drives them inside when it's both hot and cold, and why are there so many of them?! —Virginia

Well, Virginia, in my experience these pesky little invertebrates come to visit mostly in the fall and winter when the temperature drops and the rains begin. I want to reassure those folks who'd love to blame their roommates or spouses for the invasions that they have absolutely nothing to do with bad housekeeping. These ants basically strive for and thrive in the same perfect Goldilocks conditions that you and I enjoy—75 degrees and dry. So, idyllic conditions are what they're seeking when they invade your space. (But they're happy to take advantage of any food you've left around once they're there!)

The "they" we're talking about is not just any ant species that happens to be in your neighborhood: "They" are Argentine ants. If this were a movie, there would be a scream right now—Oh my GOD!!!! NOT ARGENTINE ANTS!

Ants are one of the dominant insects on the earth, and there are 14,000 different species of them. In California 250 species exist, and more than 100 of them live in the Bay Area. The only regions without ants are Antarctica and the

The truth about caffeine: how coffee really affects our bodies

Caffeine acts as a central nervous system stimulant – making you more alert and focused, but potentially also more irritable and anxious. It's all to do with your body's adenosine receptors, which help to regulate your heart rate, blood flow and sleep-wake cycles. When adenosine – an organic compound that occurs naturally in your body – binds to these receptors, it triggers physiological responses that lead to a decrease in cellular activity, often promoting drowsiness and sleep.

Caffeine can fool your nerve cells and bind to these instead, preventing adenosine from doing its thing. This promotes increased

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...can be depressing, to put it all together makes it a mood booster for many people, but can also lead to anxiety after high doses. While your body adapts to caffeine's effects after a while, different people can have very different responses to the same amount of it.

There is some evidence that its mood-elevating effects can be beneficial over the long term. In a 2016 meta-analysis of observational studies, caffeine consumption was found to decrease the risk of depression, while a Finnish study from 2010 found a similar result with coffee. In the Finnish study, the connection was weaker when other caffeinated drinks were consumed – suggesting that there is something in coffee specifically that can affect mood. One theory is that it's the antioxidants, as these tend to correlate with reduced stress overall.

Coffee can also help with burning fat, but it's most effective in conjunction with exercise. So, having a quick cup before your morning workout does more than just give you an energy boost.

What time of day should you stop drinking it?

This is hotly contested. Caffeine has a half-life of about six hours, which means that if you have your final espresso at 4pm, half of the caffeine is still in your system at 10pm, when you should be winding down for the night. Plenty of people subscribe to the idea of a caffeine curfew – stopping at 2pm or 3pm, for instance – but that doesn't mean it's open season in the morning.

Does how you drink it make a difference? In short: yes. Darker roasts, as well as being lower in caffeine, tend to contain fewer antioxidants and lower levels of chlorogenic acid, a compound that can protect the body against inflammation and cell damage. When you grind the beans doesn't matter (unless you prefer that fresh-ground flavour), but how much you grind them probably does – a finer grind releases more polyphenols, giving fine-ground brews slightly more beneficial effects.

March Fire-smart Tips from the UC Master Gardeners

MARCH: Remove and replace invasive plants

- Remove invasive plants such as ivy, broom, and pampas grass that spread quickly, cause harm to the environment, add considerable fuel for fire and use precious water.
- Unfortunately, excessive clearing can create a vulnerable entry point for the plants we do not want.
- Pull weeds and invasive plants before they go to seed to keep them from spreading.
- Replace with California natives, pollinator or low water use plants keeping drought tolerance and biodiversity in mind.
- For persistent invasives, consider sheet mulching to help with weed suppression. Additional information on appropriate mulches and use can be found following the link below.

The King Cake Tradition, Explained

A sweet, circular pastry, cake, or bread that is the centerpiece of a historically Catholic celebration known as Epiphany, which falls on January 6. Today it takes on many different forms and is found at a variety of similar celebrations with religious origins. Most Americans are likely familiar with Louisiana-style king cakes that consist of a cake-y bread dough twisted into a ring and decorated with colored icing and sprinkles. Variants can be made from cake batter or bread dough or pastry, but almost all versions are shaped into a circle or oval to mimic the appearance of a king's crown.

Every king cake contains a trinket — often a small figurine in the shape of a baby — which plays a crucial part in the celebration of the holiday that inspired this pastry. Whomever finds the trinket in their slice of cake gets to be the “king” for a day.

King cake is said to have originated in Old World France and Spain and came to be associated with Epiphany during the Middle Ages. When it was brought to the New World (along with Catholicism and Christianity), the tradition evolved further.

In New Orleans, king cake and Mardi Gras go hand in hand: The cakes can be found starting in early January and are available up until Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent. The symbolic bean or baby baked (or embedded) into the king cake is important to Mardi Gras celebrations because the person who gets the piece containing the baby must host the next year's celebration.

While there's a long history of hiding trinkets inside king cakes, the modern tradition of a small plastic baby started in New Orleans. A commercial bakery called McKenzie's popularized the baby trinket that was baked into cakes back in the 1950s; they were originally made of porcelain but later swapped out for an easier-to-find plastic version. These days the plastic baby figurine is typically sold along with the already-baked cake and hidden by the purchaser, rather than coming baked inside (due to concerns about eating something that's been baked around a piece of plastic).

Most tattooed couple in the world

Charlotte Guttenberg, 76, and Charles Helmke, 81, from Melbourne, Florida, have spent a combined 2,000 hours in the tattooist's chair in order to ink their bodies. The couple, who met in a tattoo parlor in 2006 and eventually got together after feelings blossomed, both hold the Guinness World Record for being the most tattooed senior citizen in their respective genders.

Charlotte, who only began getting tattoos at the age of 57, has said that she has reached her limit after covering 98.75 per cent of her body in ink, and won't

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Charlotte got her first tattoo at 57 in November 2006 as a birthday present after the death of her second husband, who had forbidden her from getting any. That's when she met Chuck, who offered to hold her hand while she got inked, and they began dating a year later. She soon added more and more ink to the skin, holding a separate Guinness World record for the most feather tattoos on a person, with 216. Only her head and her fingers have remained tattoo-free, but Charlotte had stressed that her tattoos don't define her life or who she is.

Meanwhile, Chuck got his first tattoo when he was much younger, at the age of 18 in 1959 during his basic training with the US army.

While he got two more tattoos on the same day as he got his first one, Chuck waited 41 years before getting inked again.

This Exquisite “Underground Cathedral” Has Been Carved Entirely Out of Salt

When you imagine places of worship, traditional structures like Gothic churches, colorful mosques, and dazzling Buddhist temples likely come to mind. If you've ever visited Wieliczka, Poland, however, you know that not all holy buildings follow this formula. In fact, some—like the the “underground cathedral” in the **Wieliczka Salt Mine**—aren't buildings at all!

Nestled over 1,000 feet below the Polish town, this subterranean shrine dates back to the Middle Ages. As a result of centuries-long construction, the church houses four exquisitely constructed chapels. Each one is adorned with relief sculptures, free-standing statues, and detailed furnishings—including “crystal” chandeliers and granite-like altars—crafted entirely from **rock salt**.

Given the beauty and complexity of the site's design, one may expect a talented team of architects and artists to be responsible. However, the awe-inspiring “underground cathedral” was actually built by Catholic miners seeking a convenient way to worship.

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working underground in constant danger, in darkness, and away from their families,” the mine’s website states. “They created underground chapels as places where they could pray, gain strength and energy before facing the challenges that awaited them and seek the protection of the patron saints of the underworld.”

While it started as a pious place for reflection, the Wieliczka Salt Mine is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site and a popular tourist destination. Every year, it welcomes over 1.2 million visitors, who enjoy seeing, touching, and yes, even licking, the splendid salt cathedral.

Stop flossing your teeth after you brush

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- Floss in a C-shape between each tooth.
- Use a water flosser, like this Waterpik, if string floss is too difficult for you to use.
- Don't use objects that aren't designed for flossing -- for instance, a knife, a sharp card or a safety pin.

Winner of National Geographic's Photo of the Year

“Wherever there’s salmon there’s going to be chaos.” This was Karthik Subramaniam’s motto as he camped out near the shore of the Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve in Alaska, waiting for action.

It was the final day of his week-long photography trip and just a few hours before his ferry departed, but the software engineer-turned-hobbyist photographer stayed, watching as bald eagles swooped in

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sandwiched between the inlet, rocks and the largest congregations of bald eagles in the world every fall, when around 3,000 arrive in time for the salmon run.

Subramaniam noticed there was a log where a few lingered. This choice spot put the eagles in proximity to the shore, where their peers would sometimes arrive with the spoils of a successful hunt: a freshly caught salmon. When a fish appeared, the bystanders would descend for their portions.

As Subramaniam trained his lens on a branch, there was a commotion: an incoming eagle swooped in, intimidating its current resident, and claiming the prime spot. He titled the resulting image “Dance of the Eagles” as an homage to a fictional dragon war in George R.R. Martin’s novel *A Dance with Dragons*, and submitted it to the *National Geographic* Pictures of the Year contest.

What Subramaniam appreciates most about the photo is the tension of the moment. “It opens up the question: what happened next?” he says. The reality is less mysterious: the triumphant eagle got bored when no salmon appeared and soon surrendered the spot to the next hungry observer.
