

The <u>Great ShakeOut</u> is the world's largest earthquake drill. Each year on the third Thursday in October, participants all over the world use this opportunity to practice what they would do in the event of a sudden earthquake.

This year, the Great ShakeOut in California will take place at 10:15 a.m. on **Thursday, October 15**. Most participate by <u>registering</u> to practice <u>Drop</u>, <u>Cover, and Hold On</u>.

Why is it important to do an earthquake drill? To react quickly, you must practice often. You may only have seconds to protect yourself in an earthquake before strong shaking knocks you down — or drops something on you. Practicing helps you to be ready to respond.

If you are inside a building, move no more than a few steps, then:

- DROP to the ground
- Take COVER by getting under a sturdy desk or table
- HOLD ON to it until the shaking stops.

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If you are outdoors when the shaking starts, you should find a clear spot away from buildings, trees, streetlights, and power lines, then Drop, Cover and Hold On. Stay there until the shaking stops.

If you are driving, pull over to a clear location, stop, and stay there with your seatbelt fastened until the shaking stops. Once it's over, proceed with caution and avoid bridges or ramps that might have been damaged.

Ground shaking during an earthquake is seldom the cause of injury. Most earthquake-related injuries and deaths are caused by collapsing walls and roofs, flying glass, and falling objects. It is extremely important for a person to move as little as possible to reach the place of safety he or she has identified. Most injuries occur when people try to move more than a short distance during the shaking.

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
